Corrective Measures Proposal for Precision Metal Products 850 West Bradley Avenue, in El Cajon

Why This Community Update? Our agency, the Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC), invites you to review and comment on a draft Corrective Measures Proposal (draft CMP) developed to address soil vapor impacted by volatile organic compounds (VOCs) at the Precision Metal Products site located at 850 West Bradley Avenue in El Cajon (Site). The draft CMP describes the environmental studies conducted, results and proposed cleanup activities for VOCs, primarily trichloroethene (TCE) and tetrachloroethylene (PCE).

Environmental sampling results from the Site show contaminants beneath the Site do **not** pose an immediate risk to site workers, public health or the environment. However, DTSC determined the levels of VOCs in soil vapor is above protective standards for workers and a plan needs to be developed and implemented to ensure continued health and safety of workers and future building occupants.

Why Cleanup Actions are Necessary: The cleanup actions are needed to mitigate VOCs in soil vapor from potential migration into indoor air to ensure continued protection of current and future Site's workers.

Site Location and History: The Site is approximately 4.67 acres and is located at 850 West Bradley Avenue, El Cajon. The surrounding



community is comprised of industrial/commercial businesses and properties. The Site was reportedly occupied by Fairchild Camera and Instrument Corp. (now Fairchild Imaging, Inc.) since it's development in the early 1960's. In 1968, the predecessor to JMM CA purchased the assets of Fairchild and operated the Site facility under the name Precision Metal Products, Inc (PMP). The assets of JMM CA, including the PMP facility, were purchased by HBD Industries in 2007 and maintained the PMP name. PMP is a manufacturer of closed die forged and machined metal products for the medical and aerospace/defense industries. Hazardous materials used at the Site include acids, petroleum hydrocarbons, and chemicals with volatile organic compounds (VOCs).

What is the draft Corrective Measures Proposal? The draft CMP is a document that describes the remedial alternatives on how exposure from contaminated soil and soil vapor can be prevented. It also recommends a proposed remedy for the Site. The draft CMP recommends installation of a Sub-Slab Depressurization (SSD) system at the Site and restricting the property to commercial industrial use through a Land Use Covenant (LUC). A design document for the SSD will be prepared and submitted to DTSC for review and approval. Once approved and implemented, diagnostic testing will be performed, and indoor air samples will be collected and analyzed to ensure that the SSD works as designed. Also, a LUC will be signed and recorded with the San Diego County. The LUC will specify certain restrictions such as:



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- no residential, daycare, school or hospital for humans;
- no interference with Sub Slab Depressurization System;
- no disturbance of soil without a soil management plan.

You are encouraged to review the document and provide your comments or concerns during the public comment period. DTSC will consider all the comments before making a final decision on the proposed remedy for the Site.

California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA): CEQA is a state law. It requires state and local agencies to identify the environmental impacts of their actions. DTSC prepared a Notice of Exemption (NOE) because the project is considered a minor action designed to prevent, minimize, stabilize, mitigate or eliminate release of hazardous waste or hazardous substances.

How You Can Participate: We want to know what you think of the draft CMP. The 30-day public comment period for the draft CMP begins June14, 2019 and ends July 16, 2019. All public comments must be postmarked or e-mailed by July 16, 2019, and sent to:
