Public Webinar: Management of Waste Photovoltaic Modules as Universal Waste in California

The Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) will hold a public webinar on December 17, 2020, to present information on the recently approved regulation to manage waste photovoltaic modules (PV modules), commonly known as solar panels, as universal waste under California's Universal Waste Program.

This webinar is intended to familiarize people with the requirements of the new regulation for managing PV modules as universal waste under California's Universal Waste Program.

Background

DTSC's new solar panel regulation, allowing them to be managed under California's universal waste program, will be effective starting January 1, 2021. The new regulation, established under Senate Bill 489, is designed to provide a less restrictive and streamlined alternative for managing hazardous solar panels under universal waste management standards instead of full hazardous waste regulations.

Under the new regulation, any entity that generates solar panel waste will now have an option to manage them as universal waste without needing to test them for the hazardous waste characteristic of toxicity. Both federal Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) and California non-RCRA hazardous waste solar panels may be managed as universal waste in California. The universal waste

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designation only applies to solar waste in California. The waste must comply with respective local, state, and federal regulations once the waste is transported outside California.

The new regulation applies to handling, collection, accumulation, and transportation aspects of solar panels waste management and allows self-authorization for universal waste handlers to conduct certain treatment activities on solar panels. Once solar panels that are managed as universal waste are discarded, the waste becomes subject to all hazardous waste regulations, and the waste then must be disposed of as hazardous waste under full hazardous waste standards.
